[10] 1. Use mathematical induction to prove that for every $n \geq 1$,

$$1 \cdot 2 \cdot 3 + 2 \cdot 3 \cdot 4 + 3 \cdot 4 \cdot 5 + \dots + n(n+1)(n+2) = n(n+1)(n+2)(n+3)/4.$$
